



Recent work


Over the past 3 years we have spent about \$557 million on capital projects including:

 The George Street Retail Quarter upgrade

 replacing kms of old water, wastewater and stormwater pipes, mains and sewers

 resealing roads and footpaths, and kerb and channel work

 Te Puna o Whakaehu – the new Mosgiel Pool




Recent work

 - New kerbside collection services








Some of our work in progress

- **Kettle Park** dune protection




2024/25 Budget: Operations \$401m








How we fund our operating costs 2024/25








2024/25 Capital Budget \$206m
